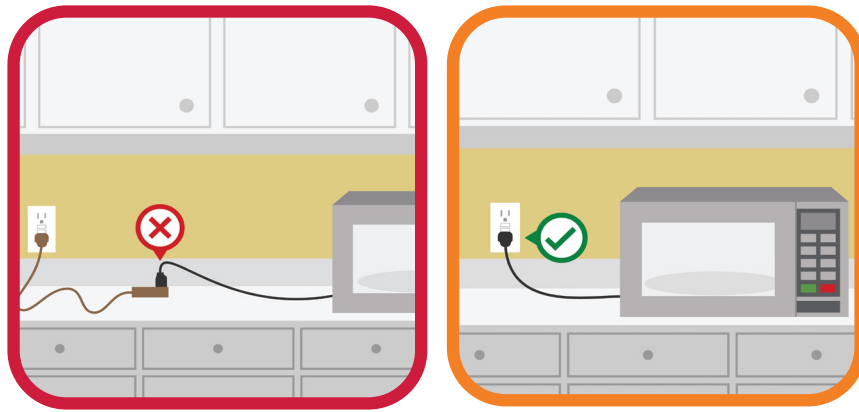

Electrical hazards

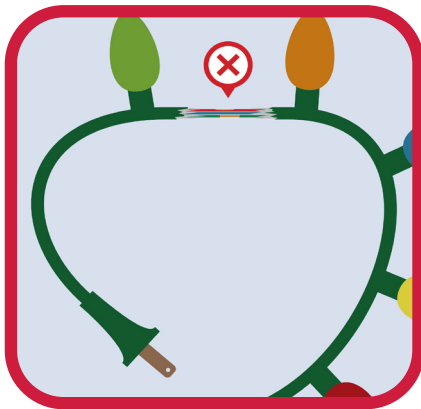
Here are a few common electrical hazards to watch out for, so you can be safe this holiday season and throughout the year.

If it's damaged, toss it



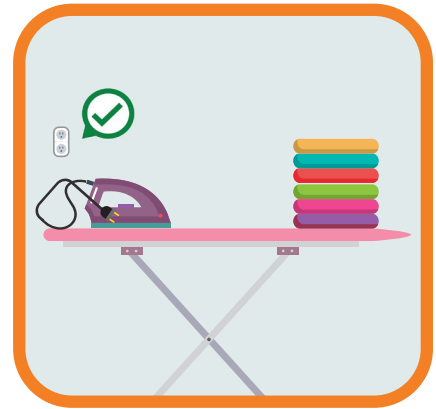
Never use or try to repair damaged electrical cords.
