

- → Over 164,000 people, six per cent of Toronto's population seniors, families, refugees , recent immigrants and people with special needs
  - → Almost 60,000 households 20,000 seniors
- •66,000 young people under 25 years old
- → People from diverse ethno-cultural backgrounds who speak over 100 languages
  - → 70% working, 30% on social assistance
  - Average annual income is \$14,000 in subsidized households – City's average income is \$69,125





# GOOD PLACES toLIVE ...investing to improve

- → Invested \$107 million to repair and upgrade our buildings and increase energy efficiency, including \$30 million through our *Building Renewal Program* and almost \$3 million at Regent Park and Don Mount Court
- → Invested \$9 million through *Participatory Budgeting* and *Community Business Planning* where tenants have a say on what gets funded
- → Invested \$7 million to open and renew community spaces, playgrounds, community gardens, basketball courts and soccer fields worked with tenants, staff and community partners, like the Toronto Police Service, on community safety
- → Built the foundation for the first phase of Regent Park and began marketing units at Don Mount Court
- → Created a pipeline of projects to develop 1,800 units replacement and new affordable that will be occupied beginning 2008-2009
- → Began an advocacy campaign to get the \$300 million needed now to fix our aging buildings



## GREEN FUTURE

...saving the planet for our children by taking action against climate change

- → Replaced thousands of old fridges, stoves, showerheads, toilets and furnaces with energy efficient models, saving over \$1.2 million and netting a three per cent reduction in energy use across the portfolio
- Reduced our greenhouse gas emissions by more than 12,000 tonnes per year equal to taking over 6,400 cars off the road
- Conserved enough water through our Low Flow Program to fill the Rogers Centre with the roof closed
- → Changed the way we bought products and services to reflect our commitment to health and the environment
- → Partnered with tenants on the *Brahms Energy*Saving Team to reduce energy consumption in their community through energy-saving light bulbs, save \$17,000 in energy savings and win the 2006 Green Toronto Award for Community Initiative
- Awarded the 2006 NRCAN Energy Star of the Year Award in Market Transformation for our Appliance Replacement Program and leadership in energy efficiency improvements



### STRONG COMMUNITIES

...building healthy neighbourhoods where tenant voices count

- ⇒ Surveyed over 3,000 tenants to find out how we're doing and help us create our goals for 2007 and beyond
- → Consulted with 8,000 tenants, community agencies, politicians, labour partners and neighbours to shape our Community Management Plan 2007-2009
- $\Rightarrow\,$  Required contractors to hire tenants as 20% of their workforce when improving our buildings and neighbourhoods
- → Held our second *Tenant Election*, marked by a Mayor's proclamation to commemorate *Tenant Participation Day*, electing 391 Tenant Reps, including 23 youth, to sit on Tenant Councils for a three year term
- → Invested \$1 million on 21 projects through our Social Investment Fund to address social and economic challenges through collaboration between tenants and community agencies



## **EQUAL** OPPORTUNITIES

creating pathways to jobs, education and civic engagement

- → Provided 18 scholarships to encourage anti-racism work, creativity, academic and athletic excellence and leadership in business in partnership with Scadding Court, University of Toronto and the Blue Jays Foundation
- → Created 17 internships for youth 13 with Toronto Community Housing and four with IBM
- → Hired 308 youth as summer staff 47% from Toronto Community Housing neighbourhoods
- → Hired 146 youth, in partnership with local agencies and contractors, to improve our neighbourhoods and buildings
- → Connected 318 youth from our communities to summer jobs through job fairs
- → Connected five youth with national and international developmental opportunities in Vancouver, India & Turkey
- → Engaged 123 youth in leadership programs
- → Partnered with the *Ontario Justice Education Network* to mentor 30 youth to act as lawyers, judges and jury in two mock trials at Old City Hall
- → Held *Get Your Hustle On* a two-day forum to connect 500 young people to scholarships, internships, sustainable employment and education
- → Created *HERstory: Breaking Barriers to create a bond in sisterhood*, an event for 100 young women between 12-16 years old, to talk about issues facing young women

# GREAT PLACE to WORK

...fostering a culture of continuous learning and a team environment

- → Ratified our first-ever collective bargaining agreements with our three labour unions Local 79, Local 416 and Local 529
- ⇒ Improved organizational health through Rewards and Recognition events, celebrating cultural and ethnic holidays and the diversity of staff and tenants
- → Developed a Leadership Program with the Schulich School of Business for senior managers and staff from community agencies who work with us
- → Raised \$275,000 for United Way
- → Awarded the Mayor's Community Safety Award for the CHOICE Program in partnership with the Carpenters Local 27 Training & Trust Fund and the YMCA
- → Received the CMHC Award for Significant Contribution to Social Housing and Community Renewal in Canada – Derek Ballantyne for Toronto Community Housing
